**Impacts on the education system and freedom of expression
as a consequence of the situation in Honduras**

The General Conference,

Taking into account the Constitution of UNESCO,

Welcoming the declarations of the Director-General of UNESCO expressed in his press releases about the situation in Honduras,

Expressing concern with the negative impacts on the functioning of the education system of Honduras,

1. *Requests* the Director-General to keep following the developments in Honduras strictly in the fields of competence of UNESCO according to its Constitution.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

The Constitution of UNESCO establishes full respect for human rights and, in particular, entrusts the Organization with the protection of the right to education and the right to information in images and words.

Recent events in Honduras are putting the exercise of these rights at risk. It is therefore appropriate and timely for UNESCO to address the situation, in fulfilment of its constitutional mandate.

Last week, it was decided to end the school year in October. Universities have been closed. This has had an undeniably negative effect on the right to education in Honduras.

The crisis has also resulted in serious infringements on the right to freedom of information and the closure of some newspapers. Channel 36 and Radio Globo remain closed. The Special Rapporteur of the United Nations Commission on Human Rights on the promotion and protection of the right to freedom of opinion and expression, Mr Frank La Rue, reported on 9 October that cameramen and photographers have been victims of police violence and have had their equipment and materials confiscated.

The following resolution endorses the concern expressed by the Director-General in his decision to monitor developments in the situation.
